### UNMAS UNISFA ON THE DRIVE OF MAKING ABYEI COMMUNITIES A SAFE AND HABITABLE PLACE

Since April 2023, the Sudanese Armed Forces (SAF) and the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces (RSF) have been at the center of a civil war in Sudan, causing humanitarian crisis and displacement. Many Sudanese moved to Abyei because they felt safer with international peacekeepers (UNISFA) there.

United Nations Mine Action Service (UNMAS) works to improve safety for mission personnel and the Abyei population, focusing on eradicating explosive ordnance. UNMAS collaborates with UNISFA to protect returnees by addressing explosive threats through Explosive Ordnance Risk Education (EORE), creating a safer resettlement environment. Mr. Aymen Mohammed, a UNMAS EORE facilitator, highlighted that UNMAS's EORE initiatives have improved safety, awareness, and resilience among local communities, especially returnees.

UNMAS's EORE activities educate returnees about explosive hazards, including landmines and explosive remnants of war (ERW), reducing accidents and injuries. Practical safety precautions are taught, such as sticking to well-traveled routes and reporting threats. Communities actively report explosive devices, enabling prompt removal and improving safety. Incidents have decreased due to safety instructions and vigilance.

UNMAS focuses on vulnerable populations, providing specifically tailored EORE to women and children. This approach has led to better identification and avoidance of explosive ordnance. Community-Based EORE collaborates with local organizations and leaders to educate returnees, ensuring sustainability. Training local facilitators also empowers communities to continue educating others about explosive threats in their areas of living.

UNMAS's efforts help returnees feel more confident about returning home. Mr. Abdul Hamdin Mohammed, a community leader, stated that EORE activities have improved safety, resilience, and health, contributing to a safer environment for livelihoods.
